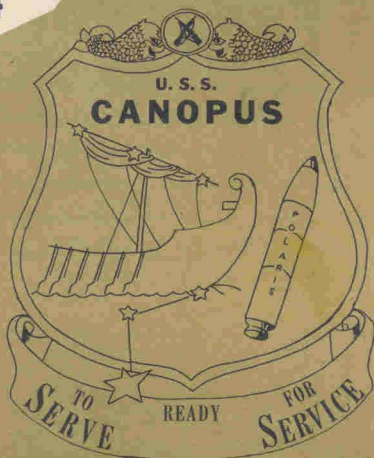

White

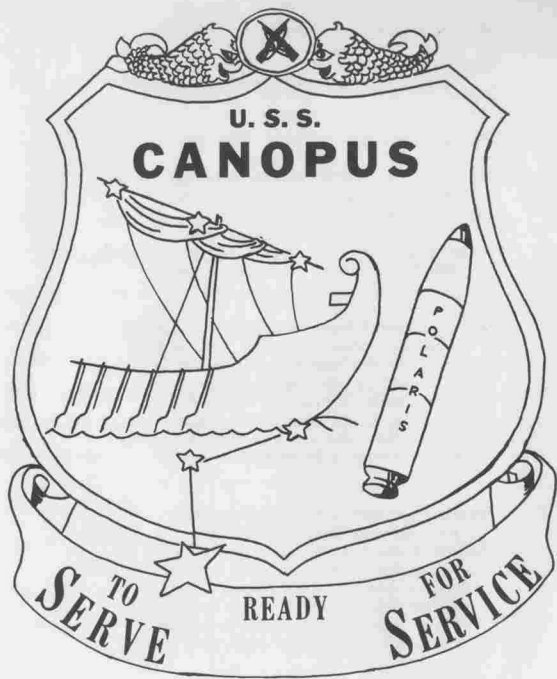
Second, a thread from the stars of the Greeks,

THE SHIP'S EMBLEM

The ship's emblem represents in symbolic form the character of the ship. The CANOPUS emblem is a shield signifying the defensive and protecting function of the ship as opposed to the aggressive cutting edge of a combatant. The Greek ship and the star cluster represent the Argo Navis constellation in which the star CANOPUS resides. The big star connecting the scroll and the shield is CANOPUS. Flying through the void of space beside the constellation is the POLARIS missile guided and watched by the helmsman, the big star. The smiling dolphins above are symbolic of our primary mission to cheerfully tend our undersea brood. The crossed rifles, encircled, recall the heroic stand of the embattled crew of CANOPUS I, AS-9, on Bataan. The motto set in a banner of the bottom pledges our dedicated readiness to serve in the Canopus tradition of determined performance.

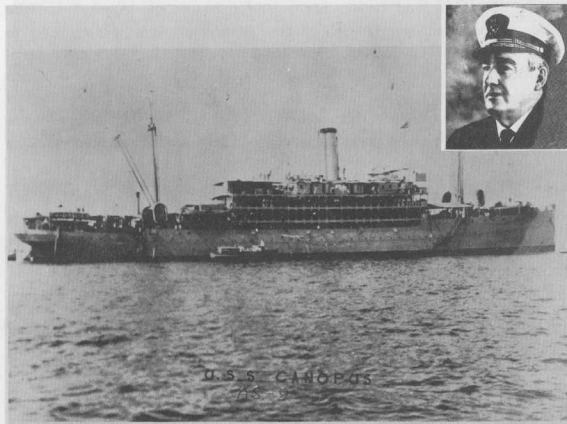

A PROUD TRADITION

The first CANOPUS, originally built for the merchant service, was acquired from Grace Lines, converted into a submarine tender and commissioned at the Boston Naval Shipyard on 22 January 1922. The AS-9 was a 373-foot vessel having a standard displacement of 5,975 tons.

The AS-9 story is one of distinguished service, ended in the Philippines during World War II on a note of gallantry and courage. With the Army falling back on Manila, CANOPUS, under the command of Commander E. L. Sackett (now Rear Admiral, Retired) sailed to Mariveles Bay at the tip of Bataan on Christmas Day 1941. On 29 December 1941 and 2 January 1942 she received direct bomb hits which caused 13 dead and injured and substantial damage to the ship. Nonetheless, working at a fevered pace, her men continued to care for other ships while keeping their own afloat and in operation. To forestall further Japanese attacks, smoke pots were placed around the ship and the appearance of an abandoned hulk was presented by day, while at night the ship hummed with activity.

Although the last of the submarines had left CANOPUS before the

New Year, her activity continued as she cared for small craft and equipment of the Army and Navy. She provided health and comfort facilities to our beleaguered ground forces. Her storerooms were thrown open to every request, and articles not in stock were improvised. AS-9 crew members took part in the ground fighting as a hastily-formed naval battalion and they wrote a record of gallantry in fierce fighting. Under the command of the Executive Officer, "Hap" Goodall, the CANOPUS launches were converted into miniature gunboats which attacked Japanese moving along the shore, causing substantial casualties.

Through February and March of 1942, CANOPUS stuck it out at her bomb-thrashed anchorage. As a hospital, machine shop, communications center, supply store, or USO, she was all things to all forces fighting on Bataan. And because of her faithful service they called her "The Old Lady." But the overwhelming enemy strength could not be held off forever and, upon the surrender of Bataan on 9 April 1942, CANOPUS was ordered scuttled and sunk to deny her use to the Japanese. On 10 April 1942 she was backed off into deep water under her own power and there the brave veteran whom the enemy could not sink ended a lifetime of service to the Navy when she was laid to rest by her own men.

AS-9 was gone but the human part of her, her people, remained. They joined the naval forces for the last-ditch fight at Corregidor. There was no such thing as sinking the spirit of "The Old Lady."

U.S.S. CANOPUS (AS-34)

Functions

The function of USS CANOPUS is to provide vital mobile base facilities and support for FBM submarines, especially for those deployed to advanced operating bases such as those in Scotland, Spain and Guam. Without base mobility, the FBM Weapon System would be completely dependent on fixed bases. With base mobility, however, the capability exists to move the geographic location of operations of the Polaris force. Should the need arise, the tender, as a "home base", can be moved anywhere on the seven seas.

CANOPUS has been designed to service and repair virtually every part and piece of equipment in any nuclear Polaris submarine. She conforms to the concept of the "universal" tender, which means that she is capable of handling and servicing any series of Polaris missile or any class of FBM submarine.

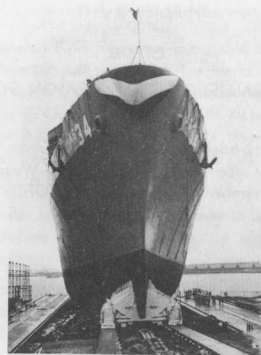
The most modern electronic equipment and industrial machinery enable CANOPUS to meet all needs of the FBM submarine for weapons, food, fuel, reactor repair, consumable supplies, and replacement parts. With the submarine alongside, CANOPUS supplies water, electrical power, and many other services. The AS-34 is a floating shipyard, a computerized supply center, an ammunition depot, and a "motel" for replacement crews. As the Navy's newest and most modern Polaris submarine tender, USS CANOPUS is a major achievement in supporting the FBM Weapon System as a primary deterrence against nuclear attack.

HISTORY

Of The

FLEET BALLISTIC MISSILE WEAPON SYSTEM

In the uncommonly brief period of five years from the original concept to operational service, the Fleet Ballistic Missile Weapon System became operational on 15 November 1960 when the USS GEORGE WASHINGTON (SSBN 598) deployed at sea with a full load of 16 Polaris tactical missiles.

Polaris is a powerful deterrent in nuclear attack because it is constantly on station beneath the seas, hidden from any potential enemy, completely under U. S. control, ready for firing within minutes of receiving the command, and having sufficient range to reach any target on earth with fantastic accuracy.

Beside the Polaris missile itself, the FBM Weapon System includes nuclear-powered missile-launching submarines, sea and shore support facilities exemplified by USS CANOPUS and Charleston Naval Base activities, and the men who actually operate and maintain the system.

THE MISSILE

Polaris, named for the North Star, is a two stage ballistic missile powered by solid fuel rocket motors and guided by a self-contained inertial guidance system independent of external commands or control. Currently, Polaris A-1, with a range of 1,200 nautical miles, is carried by the first five SSBN's to go on operational patrols. The A-1 is now being phased out and replaced by its more powerful successor, the A-2. This second-generation Polaris missile successfully extended its range to 1,500 nautical miles when launched from the submerged USS ETHAN ALLEN on 23 October 1961. Almost 85% new from the original design of the A-1, the Polaris A-3 has achieved a quantum increase in range to 2,500 nautical miles (2,875 statute miles). The A-3 has been on operational patrol since 28 September 1964.

Development has now commenced on a completely new series of missiles called the Poseidon, or C-3, as a follow-on to the Polaris for use in FBM submarines.

THE SUBMARINE

The nuclear-powered FBM submarine is capable of extended submerged operations in the international waters of the world which comprise about 70 per cent of the earth's surface. There are presently three classes of these submarines: the GEORGE WASHINGTON class which displaces 5,900 tons and is 390 feet long; the ETHAN ALLEN class which displaces 6,900 tons and is 410 feet long; and the LAFAYETTE class, which is 425 feet in length and 7,000 tons in displacement.

Each ship is driven by steam turbines powered by water-cooled nuclear reactors. Sixteen Polaris missiles are stowed in eight pairs of launching tubes located immediately aft of the "sail". Electrolytic oxygen generators produce oxygen from sea water, and clean "scrubbed" air is circulated throughout the ship by an air conditioning plant of more than 300 tons capacity.

Present plans call for a 41-ship force of Polaris submarines. Subsequent to the phase-out of the A-1 missile, 13 FBM submarines will carry the A-2 and 28 will carry the A-3. Deployed submarines are operating out of Holy Loch, Scotland; Rota, Spain; Charleston, South Carolina; and Apra Harbor, Guam. The submarines are serviced by tenders at these anchorages, receiving all necessary supplies, maintenance, and repairs. This includes supplying and loading the Polaris missiles into the submarine's launching tubes.

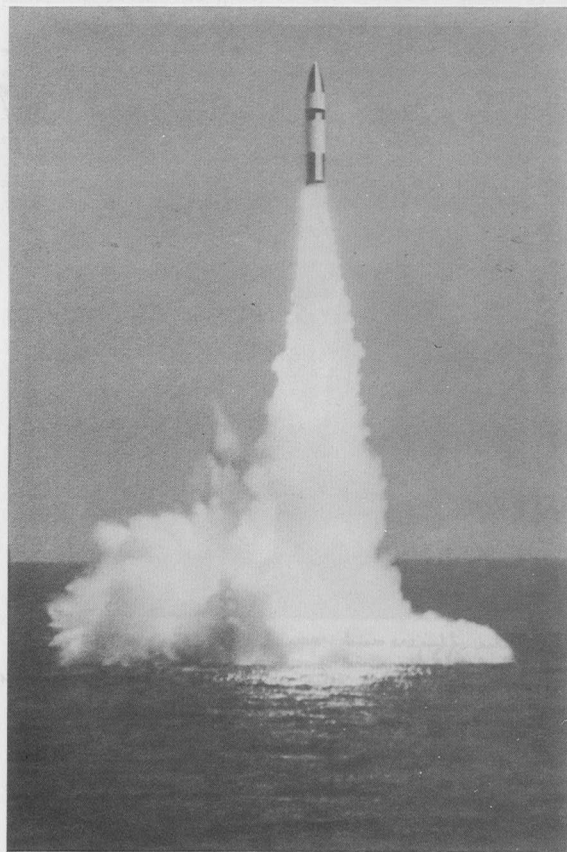
THE MEN

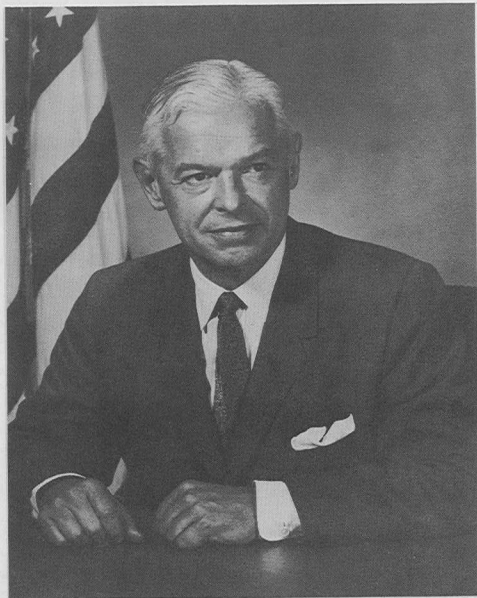
Each FBM submarine has two crews, called "Blue" and "Gold", of about 130 men and officers each. While one crew has the ship on patrol, the other is in the home port, undergoing refresher training, taking leave, breaking in new crew members, and in general getting ready to go back to sea. Since the effectiveness of the FBM Weapon System is almost entirely up to the crews who operate and maintain it, the demand is for the highest caliber of men.

To be able to maintain and operate the incredibly complicated systems of the submarine, the launch components, and of the missile itself, a man must be thoroughly familiar with the basic theory and fundamental physical principles involved. A student must grasp the basics of digital computers, inertial theory, computer logic, the use of testing devices, and so on. Some

of this training is available only at the college post-graduate level outside the Navy.

The goal of this highly specialized training is a dual one. First, the technician must be fully ready to handle his assigned responsibilities the day he sets foot in the Polaris submarine. Second, the FBM submarine must, through the means of highly technical support and maintenance, be self-sufficient. On patrol, the Polaris submarine is a world unto itself and there can be no calls for outside help or premature shortening of scheduled patrols. "Self-sufficiency" is the word for the FBM Weapon System. It is the operators and the maintainers, officers and men of the U. S. Navy, who make it so.

GRAEME C. BANNERMAN

Graeme C. Bannerman is a career civil servant and a native of Washington, D. C.

He was born in Washington, D. C. in 1910, and attended the public schools of this city.

He later attended Hamilton College, Clinton, New York, where he majored in mathematics and physics receiving a Bachelor of Science degree in 1931.

He received degrees of Bachelor of Law in 1936 and Master of Law in 1938 from the George Washington University, Washington, D. C., where he was on the staff of the George Washington Law Review. He has been a member of the bar of the District of Columbia since 1936.

With the exception of two years, 1946-1948, Mr. Bannerman's entire career has been associated with Federal procurement activities and primarily in the field of defense procurement.

Prior to World War II he was employed in positions of increasing responsibility in the Procurement Division of the Treasury Department.

For a brief period during World War II he was employed by the Defense Supplies Corporation, a subsidiary of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

He then entered naval service and was assigned, for most of his naval duty, to the Naval Aviation Supply Office in Philadelphia. He left the Navy as a Lieutenant.

In 1948 he was employed by the Bureau of Ships as a contract negotiator. In 1953, by which time he had been promoted to Deputy Director of Contracts in the Bureau of Ships, Mr. Bannerman was transferred to the Office of Naval Material where he worked until 1957.

From 1957 to 1961 Mr. Bannerman served as Director of Procurement Policy in the Office of the Secretary of Defense. In February 1961 he was appointed Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense (Procurement) by Secretary McNamara.

Mr. Bannerman has received citations for meritorious performance and, in 1963, received the Career Service Award of the National Civil Service League.

Mr. Bannerman was confirmed by the United States Senate on 19 February 1965 and sworn in as Assistant Secretary of the Navy for Installations and Logistics on 26 February 1965.

Mr. Bannerman and his wife reside in Washington, D. C. They have two daughters, Susan Campbell Bannerman and Martha Graeme Bannerman.



CAPTAIN JOHN M. BARRETT, U. S. NAVY
Commanding Officer, USS CANOPUS (AS-34)

John Michael Barrett was born in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, on 14 March 1920, the son of John J. Barrett and Margaret O'Neill Barrett of Cedar Rapids, Iowa. After graduation from high school, he entered the United States Naval Academy on 19 June 1939. He was graduated with the degree of Bachelor of Science on 19 June 1942 and commissioned as an Ensign in the U. S. Navy.

After receiving his commission, he attended the Submarine School at New London, Conn. After completing the basic officer course, he reported for duty aboard USS HALIBUT (SS-232), a unit of the Submarine Forces, Pacific. He served in this submarine from January 1943 to February 1944 completing five war patrols prior to reporting to the USS TREPANG (SS-412), in March. He served aboard TREPANG through the remainder of World War II and made an additional five war patrols in this submarine.

From August 1946 to August 1948 he was a flight training student at Corpus Christi, Texas. Upon successful completion of flight training, he re-

ported to VC-21 as a day and night carrier ASW pilot. From April 1949 until July 1950 he served as Executive Officer of VC-25. It is interesting to note that Captain Barrett holds the distinction of being one of the very few Naval officers qualified both as a Naval pilot and a submariner.

In July 1950 he reported to the Staff, Commander Carrier Division FIVE where he served as Assistant Operations Officer and served with United Nations Naval forces in Korea. In December 1950 he reported to the Fleet Airborne Electronic Training Unit, Pacific, as ASW Training Officer and from December 1951 until September 1952 he served as Test Project Pilot at the Naval Air Test Center, Patuxent River, Maryland, after having completed the Test Pilot Training Course at Patuxent.

In December 1952 he reported for duty as Executive Officer, USS SEA OWL (SS-405) and in December 1953 he assumed command of USS TIRANTE (SS-420).

After detachment as Commanding Officer of USS TIRANTE (SS-420) in January 1956, he reported for duty on the Staff, Commander-in-Chief, U. S. Atlantic Fleet as Assistant Operations Officer.

In August 1957, he reported to the U. S. Naval War College, Newport, Rhode Island for duty under instruction in the senior course. After graduation in June 1958, he reported to the Staff of the Commander Submarine Force, U. S. Pacific Fleet, where he served as Force Personnel and Administrative Officer, until reporting as Commander, Submarine Division SEVENTY-THREE on 20 August 1960.

In 1961, he reported to the office of the Chief of Naval Operations as Head, Submarine Systems and Requirements Branch. His last assignment prior to CANOPUS was Head, Plans and Programs Branch of the Special Projects Office in Washington.

In addition to the Silver Star Medal, two Bronze Stars, Navy and Marine Corps Medal, Navy Unit Commendation, he has been awarded the American Defense Service Medal with bronze star, American Area Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal with two silver stars, European Area Medal, World War II Victory Medal, Philippine Liberation Medal, Korean Service Medal with one star, United Nations Service Medal and the National Defense Service Medal.

Captain Barrett is married to the former Eda Joan Odem, of Sinton, Texas. Captain and Mrs. Barrett have four children.



COMMANDER MARVIN C. SCOGGINS, U. S. Navy
Executive Officer, USS CANOPUS (AS-34)

Commander Marvin Carr Scoggins, Jr., USN, a native of Durham, North Carolina, graduated from the U. S. Naval Academy in June 1947. His first tour of duty following his commission was aboard the attack transport USS CAVALIER (APA 37), which operated in the Pacific.

Commander Scoggins served as Salvage and Evacuation Officer aboard CAVALIER when the ship participated in the evacuation of foreign nationals from troubled Communist China areas from 1947 until 1949.

Following duty aboard CAVALIER, Commander Scoggins next served from March 1950 until July 1951 as an instructor at the U. S. Naval Academy Preparatory School.

Upon completion of Submarine School in December of 1951 he served, during the next nine years, as communications and operations officer aboard USS CARP (SS 338); war plans, communications and operations officer at the U. S. Submarine Base, Pearl Harbor; executive officer and later commanding officer aboard the USS BASS (SSK 2) and USS MENHADEN (SS 377); and commanding officer aboard USS GUDGEON (SS 567).

In February 1961, Commander Scoggins reported for duty on the staff of Commander Hawaiian Sea Frontier, where he served as assistant Operations Officer and anti-submarine warfare officer until he received orders in July 1962 to report to the U. S. Naval War College as a student.

He served as Flag Secretary and Aide to Deputy Commander Submarine Force U. S. Atlantic Fleet from August 1963 to July 1965.

He reported to his present assignment in July of this year aboard the Polaris submarine tender USS CANOPUS (AS 34) where he will serve as the ship's executive officer.

Commander Scoggins and his wife, the former Miss Dorothy June Peel of Carnegie, Pa., live with their three children in Charleston, South Carolina.

CANOPUS

Submarine tenders are usually named after stellar bodies or men who are famous for their work with submarines. USS CANOPUS, the largest tender in the world, is the second ship of the Fleet to bear the name of a figure in Greek mythology who was the pilot and helmsman of Menelaus, king of Sparta. After Canopus died in Egypt, he is said to have been transformed into the second brightest star in the heavens.

Canopus is the brightest star in Carine, a part of a Southern hemisphere constellation called Argo Navis or "The Ship." Only Sirius is brighter than Canopus, but since Canopus is many times more distant it is probably thousands of times greater in mass. It is about 100 light years or 600 trillion miles from earth. It is visible no farther north than about the latitude of Florida.

Of considerable interest is the fact that the star Canopus has played a significant part in the space achievement of the United States. MARINER IV, first space probe to transmit pictures of the surface of Mars, was "Locked on" to Canopus as its navigational reference for the successful 7-month flight.
