COMMAND COLUMN

It is traditional at this time of year to review the preceding twelve months and, based on the lessons of the past, resolve to do better in the future.

CANOPUS and her crew may never face a more demanding year than the one just completed. The year started with CANOPUS newly commissioned. A staggering number of milestones were passed with flying colors: shakedown, training to run the ship as a ship; the enormously complex task of assembling skills, material, and equipment to be ready to accept any work required by an SSBN; CANOPUS became qualified to handle nuclear weapons, to work on nuclear propulsion plants and to handle radioactive materials. Attack submarines were refitted. With less than half the year over CANOPUS was in the moor at the Charleston site, carrying out the mission she was built and equipped for and you were trained for - - refitting SSBN's.

The last half of the year was a similar series of momentous events and CANOPUS firsts: relief at the Charleston site; deployment, including the Lisbon visit; relieving in the moor here and tackling a 3-SSBN schedule; moving the families to Spain; adapting to the mores of a foreign country. It does not seem that we have been in Rota long but in early January the first boat we refitted will be back from the patrol following that refit. In another first for CANOPUS, we will be able to find out how well the work we did withstood the test of a patrol.

It is impossible for me to draw specific conclusions from the expe-see clearly what lies ahead. We only (continued on page 14)

riences of the past year. The events, only a few of which I have recounted, were too numerous. Unlike many of you, I was not on board for any of the significant occurrences of the first seven months.

General conclusions, on the other hand, are easy. The year was a tremendous success. There is probably no ship better equipped to handle its mission. In my experience I have never seen a crew more determined to do an outstanding job, and do it cheerfully.

In 1967 we will again be asked to perform many tasks that we have never done before and some, perhaps, that no tender has attempted before. This does not faze me. Our competence is almost unlimited. Unlike last year, we will perform many chores time and time again as SSBN follows SSBN. While experience will teach us to do some jobs better, monotonous

repetition can lead to carelessness and indifference.

Perhaps the greatest challenge of the new year, then, will be to maintain the spirit that distinguishes CANOPUS, a spirit founded on pride of workmanship, a belief in cooperating with the members of SSBN crews and with shipmates, a willingness to work until the job is done and done right. Your families will have to continue to have faith in the importance of your shipboard responsibilities.

As during the last year, this will require the best in both the minority who do repair work on SSBN's and the majority who back them up by providing services to CANOPUS and the rest of Submarine Squadron SIX-TEEN. If CANOPUS, a year from now, has the same shining spirit as today, we can be as proud of our accomplishments in 1967 as we should be for those of 1966.







BOOK REVIEWS. "The Bobsey Twins at Blue Lake", by Snidley Whiplash. A vicious novel of greed and intrigue involving the racy, international jet-set. DOLPHIN SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS

Mrs. Claire Lowrance, wife of Vice Admiral V. L. Lowrance and director of the Dolphin Scholarship Foundation, has announced March 15 as the deadline for applications in the 1967 Dolphin Scholarship competition.

Scholarships are awarded to selected students who are sons or daughters (natural, adopted, or stepchild) of members, or former members, (officer or enlisted) of the Submarine Forces and in the U. S. Navv. living or deceased.

Time required in the Submarine Force is waived if the member dies while on active duty in the Submarine Force.

Scholarships are awarded based upon recommendations of an impartial evaluation committee which makes recommendations to the Foundation after Screening all applications. This committee is composed of individuals qualified in educational matters. In the past, the board has been filled by civilian educators in the Training Division of the Bureau of Naval Personnel.
