WHY ARE WE IN VIETNAM?

"What are we doing in Vietnam? It's 10,000 miles away!"

Such a question is indicative of the somewhat provincial East Coast-Atlantic Ocean orientation which has traditionally colored our attitudes toward Asia. Vietnam is much less than 10,000 miles from our West Coast and even still closer to Hawaii.

Fundamentally, the question of nearness to Vietnam must be measured in why scaled terms. In the past 60 years, while the inhabitants of the earth doubled we have all been drawn together by a series of technological devel-

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COMMAND COLUMN

One of the myriad measures CA-NOPUS took in preparation for relieving as the deployed FRM tender in Rota was to endeavor to familiarize all hands with the conduct problems arising from the Rota environment. Conduct in CONUS had been excellent. The theme of the briefings as we steamed towards Rota was that Spanish social habits were different from ours, the resources in the Rota area available to one on liberty would be different, and our conduct as U.S. Navy sailors could affect governmental relationships between the United States and Spain.

Now that we have been on site a year, I would like once again to congratulate all hands on your conduct in Spain. This includes those who came over in CANOPUS, those from HOLLAND, and those who have reported on board in the last year from commands all over the the world. Almost all of you have been courteous and thoughtulf guests in this country, which is the basis of good conduct anywhere. You have been sensitive to Spanish customs. Obviously you appreciate the major factors involved in maintaining the reputation of CANOPUS. There are a couple of small points that some of you may not understand as well.

First is the Liberty Risk list. We are representatives of the Unit-

ed States in Spain. I have the power to ensure that the United States is well represented. This can be handled in many ways principally transfer for those who seriously jeonardize our relations with Spain, disciplinary action under UCMI, and designation of persons as liberty risks. The last action is drastic but it is an administrative, not a disciplinary, one. It is effective and yet keeps a record clean if no action other than designation as a liberty risk is taken. In this regard it is preferable, as far as an offender is concerned, to disciplinary action taken at Captain's Mast.

Since it is effective yet does not put a black mark in the service record, I will continue to employ the power in appropriate cases.

The other point to discuss is the Shore Patrol. Many of them are your shipmates. Most of them want to help you keep out of trouble on the beach, and will if you let them. If you have had so much to drink that you feel you are not in a condition to drive your car, they will drive it for you. They are not servants at your beck and call, but they have been instructed to assist in these ways. They may not always be able to depart at the moment you want to go, but they will help as soon as they can.

to avoid trouble before it starts, is cancellation of liberty by the Shore Patrol when a man has had too much to drink. This is something you must accept. The person whose liberty is cancelled is not in as good a position as is a sober Shore Patrolman to evaluate whether or not he has had so much to drink that he might end up in trouble. No doubt, many persons whose liberty get cancelled would not get in trouble if they stayed on liberty. But almost every disciplinary offense. and every vehicle offense or accident, involving CANOPUS personnel has also involved excessive drinking. If every man who had drunk too much had had his liberty cancelled in a timely fashion, we would have had almost no incidents in Spain. More important, some who were, or still are, in deep trouble which may have a drastic effect on the whole course of their lives would have been saved from grief. as would their families.

Whether the Shore Patrol is helping you, or whether it is acting in a more disciplinary role, I will brook no insolence or resistance to the Shore Patrol. Most of the time they are just doing their job, and doing it well. If the Shore Patrol acts improperly, I will handle it or the Shore Patrol can be put on report, whichever seems more appropriate. At the time, obey the Shore Patrol and be courteous to them. Treat them as you would like to be treated when you are on Shore

Patrol.

Similiar thoughts on the Shore Patrol have recently been expressed by the Force Commander, VADM SCHADE. I pass them on to let you know his subject:

"Whenever a shore patrolman on duty asks a Submarine Force Officer or enlisted man to identity himself, the officer or enlisted man is required to do so and he is well advised to tell the shore patrolman politely and promptly his name, grade, and duty station. Whenever a shore patrolman on duty asks a man for his Armed Forces Identification, Card, the officer or enlisted is required to produce it and, it requested, to surrender it to the shore patrolman. It is not prudent to annov or aggravate the Shore Patrol

over such a simple matter as identity. The card will be returned bebore its owner can continue on li-

"I want every man who goes ashore to be fully aware of the authority of the Shore Patrol, Interfering with the Shore Patrol; failure to obey an order of the Shore Patrol: and cursing, threatening, or striking the Shore Patrol are serious offenses and this conduct will not be tolerated. Every effort should be made to cooperate with Shore Patrol personnel who are carrying out their duties. If there is any disagreeemnt as to the authority of Shore Patrol or the methods by which they perform, this shall be reported to higher authority; it shall not be argued out on the scene."

DROPPINGS FROM THE RAVEN

Many times in my travels around CANOPUS the old bird is questioned about the Ship's Store retail activities. As you know, not everyone on the ship can be an ET, SK, MT, EN, FT or DC, yet, almost everyone thinks they can run the Ship's Store.

Your stores, and they are your stores, are not as simple as they may appear! All Ship's Stores are directly governed by the Navy Supply Systems Command through the Navy Ship's Store Office (NSSO) and the Navy Finance Center, Cleveland, Ohio. NSSO, as it is popu-

larly called, controls over four billion dollarsin Ship's Store/Navy Exchange sales a year. This is "Big Business"!

Every Ship's Store Officer, Ship's Store Operator, Disbursing Officer or Disbursing Agent is strictly accountable for the dollar value of the merchandise/cash in their custody. The Navy Finance Center is charged with the task of accounting for all accountable activities. When people talk of a trip to Leavenworth, in our business they are speaking of the Leavenworth Federal Prison.

The CANOPUS Ship's Store Division is charged with the job of providing a convenient, reliable source from which Submarine Squadron SIX TEEN personnel, and others, may obtain at the lowest practible cost, articles considered necessary for health, comfort, or convenience and services necessary in day-to-day living. Profits from the retail activities provide a source of funds to be used for the welfare and recreation of Submarine Squadron SIXTEEN personnel.

Normally, the Ship's Store inventory in CANOPUS exceeds \$150,000.00. It includes over 1,400 items of which 275 are of foreign origin. Each retail store carries as much stock as possible, usually amounting over \$15,000.00 in cash value.

opments: space satellites, and the ominous coupling of missiles with nuclear power. Any one of these might have been enough to end isolation - in sum, they have revolutionized the relationship of man.

This rapid change has been as much political, economic, and social as it has been technological. At the end of World War II much of the earth lay prostrate. The airplane had come into its own. It foreshortened distances and left no men or place isolated on earth.

There had also been a revolution in communications, bringing new ideas and new expectations to colonial lands. Another force, long fermenting, rose to view in major dimension. Communism, given new stature by Russian war victories, renewed its international thrust. Its aim was clearly apparent to dominate the world scene. Its tactic was twofold; subvert the industrialized nations, and fill the vacuum in once colonial lands.

The United States alone had the residual wealth, strength and spirit to take the initiative on behalf of the free nations. However, reluctantly, it moved to assume this leadership.

It soon became clear that we had entered into a continuing struggle. On the one side were those countries who wanted to create a decent world order in which nations could freely choose their own institutions, and live in peace. On the other side were those whose aim was a world of one political and economical system for all.

Those who puzzle about Vietnam today should first study what happened in Iran, Greece, Berlin, South Korea, the Philippines, Taiwan and Malaya during the past two decades. Had we and our allies not resisted communist aggression, how free would their people be today, and what kind of world would we be living in?

The basic issue at stake can be put in several ways. General Giap, commander of the North Vietnamese Army, has stated publicly: "South Vietnam is the model of the national liberation movement of our time... If the special warfare that the U.S. Imperialists are testing in South Vietnam is overcome, then it can be defeated everywhere in the world."

Lin Piao, Communist Chinese Minister of Defense, set forth the issue in clearest detail in a manifesto which all Americans would profit by studying. He pictures a move from conquest of the so-called "cities of the world" -North America and Western Europe. Vietnam is... "now the focus struggle of the people of the world against U.S. aggression:"

* When the Viet Minh supposedly withdrew to the north in 1954, they left behind a military and political cadre to organize resistance.

* The public statements of Hanoi and Peiping themselves included the announcement, in 1960, from Hanoi - not from South Vietnam - of the formation of the so-called "Front for the Liberation of the South."

* We observe the alien character of the supposedly indigenous Viet Cong. The heroes of the enemy are Ho Chi Minh and General Giap, not South Vietnamese.

* We have seen the Viet Cong employ unrestrained terror against a land which, in theory, they are defending against so-called "aggression." In 1964-65 alone, more than 2100 South Vietnamese officials and nearly 22,000 other civilians were murdered or taken away.

* We have the constantly mounting evidence of arms and ammunition supplied from North Vietnam, China and other communist nations.

* We have proof of every sort of massive, organized land and sea infiltration from the North. Regular North Vietnamese divisions have invaded South Vietnam, and the hardcore Viet Cong units rely increasingly on North Vietnamese replacements.

U. Alexis Johnson recently said: "The question is not whether Vietnam itself, or indeed Southeast Asia as a whole, is of such political, strategic or economic importance as to justify asking our men and women to risk their

Rather, the question is the world-wide effect of permitting the Communist

Education is a must today more than ever before in order to get as head in the Navy or in civilian life. So, why not take advantage of one or more Educational opportunities that the Navy has to offer. First lets take the no cost correspondence sourses-that any Enlisted man in the Navy can order. What are they you ask? Starting from Aerographers



Mate 3 & 2 to Yeoman 1 & C there are over 255 in all. Just because a man is an RD3 doesn't mean that he can't order CS1 & C course. The only exception is that we cannot order a confidential or secret course for a man that is not cleared for it. We also can order over 150 different of ficer correspondence courses. Any enlisted man below the Pay Grade of E-7 must be recommended by his Commanding Officer in order to be eligible for these courses. This is a total of over 400 free Navy correspondence courses an enlisted man can order.

Over 200 courses may be taken directly from USAFI in pre-high school, high school college and technical subjects. For an initial \$5.00 fee a student may enroll in his first USAFI course. He may thereafter continue to take other USAFI correspondence courses at no further expense as long as his progress is satisfactory.

In addition to the courses offered directly by USAFI, more than 6000 correspondence courses are available through USAFI from the extension divisions of 45 leading colleges and universities. These correspondence courses are offered at reduced prices to military personnel under the terms of contract agreements between the Federal Government and

the educational institutions.

At the present time here at Rota Naval Station we have three classes; History, Spanish and Education being given by the University of Maryland. The cost is low and you can get it for even less if you use the Navy Tuition Aid Program. The Government will pay 75% of the cost or you can use your Cold War G.I. Bill. Either way the cost is low on your part as long as you satisfactorily complete the courses.

What do you know about STAR????
This is one of the best programs the Navy ever came up with. If a man wants a service school and a fast chance to get ahead in our fast moving Navy, the benefits are great. But the Navy wants you and your skills that you learned in our schools. In return, what does the Navy offer?

Just think, if you are an E-4 with over two years service and a VRB of 1, you would receive \$2548.00 with a VRB of 2 you would make \$3807.00; VRB of 3 would be \$5076.00; and VRB 4 is \$6345.00. with over three years can get (and I think that I may start to cry right now) with a VRB of 1-\$3103.20; and with VRB of 2 it would be \$4645.00. VRB 3 receives \$6206.40; and a VRB of 4 would be \$7758.00 (WOW)-

GO MODERN NAVY


Approximately two million veterans who served during the Vietnam era, which began on Aug. 5, 1964, were placed on a par with all war veterans in eligibility for veterans benefits by the 1967 veterans assistance act, according to the Veterans Administration.

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The fighting on the front went on with more of less unabated fury with the lines stabilized along a line running from Bagac on the east coast of the Bataan Peninsula to the little town of Moron on the west. With the main portion of the Japanese effort being expended on Singapore and the Dutch East Indies, they were content to let it stay so for a while. However, with the passage of time and no help in sight at all, we knew, beyond the shadow of a doubt that our turn would come to accept the all-out Japanese effort.

Word finally filtered through that Lieut. General Yamashita, the "Tiger of Malaya" was coming to take command of the Japanese operation in the Philippines and he called the renewed operation "Jin-Sho", or all-out victory. The USAFFE forces on the front girded up their already thin loins and readied themselves for the onslaught. The Japanese tested our front lines with a series



of sharp vicious probing actions and on or about the 20th of April, launched "Jin-Sho". The morale of the front line USAFFE troops was somewhat dampened by the news of the fall of Singapore and the Dutch East Indies, but they gave the Japanese ducces and spades right back, the nature of the Japanese attacks becoming almost suicidal. I had read about the fanatical charges of the Emperor's minions in the battles in Manchuria in 1905 and their famous, bloody, empirical taking of 203 Meter Hill at Port Arthur in which all three sons of the Japanese commander in the field, General Nogi, were killed. 203 Meter Hill was the key to the defenses of Port Arthur and they presneted it to the Emperor Mutsuhito on his birthday at the cost of over 50,000 casualties. On Bataan the birthday of Hirochito came and went with all-out and bloody assaults all along the front, but the Japanese could not break through the valiant USAFFE lines of Americans and Filipionos. I have never seen such extravagant sacrifice of men on the part of the Japanese, but it was of no avail.

What the Japanese could not do, hunger and exhaustion accomplished. The USAFFE forces were down to one-half can of salmon and a bowl of unpolished rice per day and the daily diet of 900 calories was taking its toll plus the effects of the enervating climate and torrential downpours. The casualties a riving at Field Hospitals No. 1 and No. 2 were emaciated scarecrows and, as

in Babylon, the handwriting was on the wall.

On the third of April, the support and naval forces in the Bataan area got the word to destroy all the supplies that could not be gotten across the North Channel to Corregidor. Demolition parties scoured the Peninsula laying charges and preparing for what was becoming increasingly apparent - evacuation to the fortress island and the abandonment of Bataan. Captain Sackett, the officers and men of the "Old Lady Mamasan" wanted to run for it to the south, even with an injured ship, but the request was denied by the authorities of the of the Sixteenth Naval District, now resident on Corregidor and the sorrowful preparations were made to give the "Old Lady" her coup-de-grace. I remember one incident that gave me a great deal of food for thought. In Sisamin Cove. over the hill from the old Linlinbon Quarry, lay the beached and bombed out Philippine survey vessel "Research". Prior to her transfer to the Commonwealth Maritime Services, she had been the U.S. Coast and Geodetic Survey ship "Pathfinder" and my father had served in her in 1900, 1901 and 1902. She was inspected and found to be salvagable, at which art the Japanese are past-masters. It was decided that she would be on the hit parade, also, when the other sinews of war went up in the Mariveles area. I hiked over to Sisamin Cove and got aboard the "Research", walking around her listing decks alone decks that my father had trod so many years before and it was with a deep, sad feeling that I heard her go up - the inevitable way of ships and men. The sepia tint shows the "Research" beached on Bataan.

On the 4th, 5th and 6th of April the constant lightning of incessant gunfire flashed all along the front to the north and we knew that it was the last stand and would go down in history along with Khartoum, the Little Big Horn, The British at Isandhlwana in the Zulu War, and the Alamo. Dear comes the price of immortality in military history and our men on the front were finding out that price. Stragglers and wounded began to arrive in the Mariveles area and the situation was highly confused and most nebulous according to the bulletins issued to the outside world by USAFFE Headquarters. Final preparations were made for the abandonment of Bataan. All the installations around Mariveles Bay were mined, including the big "Dewey" drydock and the tunnels in the face of the bluff on the eastern side of the harbor. The night of the 7th, I went across the channel in the old Cavite navy ferry "San Felipe" with a load of evacuees and wounded. It was a beuatiful night - I remember casually glancing at the planet Saturn through my binoculars and it was in such a situation that I could see the rings around the planet. The sight couldn't hold a candle, however, to the noisy Saturnalia that was taking place on the Peninsula sa it was finally abandoned, tunnels blowing up, dumps and warehouses on fire and the Japanese had pushed their artillery forward so fast that they were already shelling us from the Zigzag Road at Little Baguio. When the charges in the drydock "Dewey" were detonated, she was outlined in fiery delineation like a Fourth of July setpiece and she disintegrated into the waters of the harbor. The tunnels went into blasts of dynamite and huge boulders were shot out into the harbor, smashing small ats with evacuees and taking quite a few casualties, including men of the "Old Lady", which stood at her moorings in Linlinbon, with steam roaring up her escape pipe, preparing for her last getting-underway. She was taken outisde the sixty fathom curve, beyond the Los Cochinos Rocks and scuttled and it was a sad, demoralizing feeling to know that my home for almost three years was gone. However, the events of the moment were giving no time for such melancholy musing - we were making our last organized stand and the men of the "Canopus" were to have an important part in that stand. Although they were taken, lock, stock and barrel into the defenses of Corregidor the aura of the "Old Lady" bound them together stronger than the oath of the Knights of Malta.

We were assigned to Queen's Tunnel along with the remnants of the Sixteenth Naval District Staff and settled down, in more or less haphazard manner, to await the events of a most insecure future and the possible inevitable end - death or capture.
