
Vinny's obit from the St. Petersburg Times:

Vinny was saving money for when he got out, so never went on liberty. Here he is relaxing in the Photo Lab listening to music.






With Mike Gordon, his co-worker from the Print Shop.




We did a lot of goofy things together. Here he is with Don Appleby and Jim 'Mac' McKee imitating the three monkeys.
